



Scotch 101...

Stage 1 - Observe

Enjoy the whisky's color (this will tell you something about the wood in which it has been matured), brightness (un-chill-filtered whiskies often go slightly hazy with water) and viscosity (see the 'tears' on the inside of the glass when you swirl the spirit).



Stage 2 - Nosing (Neat, Diluted described on next slide)

Sniff cautiously (mouth open or you may 'burn' your nose), and observe the nose-feel' - prickly, cooling warming, etc. Then note the primary aromas - first impressions are all important here. Bear in mind the overall complexity and intensity of the sample. Repeat the undiluted nosings experimenting with distance to draw out different aromas.



Take a sip of the whisky now. Remember that most prefer to either hold their breathe or to exhale slowly while sipping to avoid burning the nose. Coat the tongue, chew and wait for the tastes and finish. Some single malts can have a very long and lingering finish, so waaaaaait for it!

Tasting #1 – Strathisla – Premium Vault \$15 42 Year Old Bottle from Gordon & Macphail Distilled 50 Years Ago - 1967

Colour: Dark Amber

Nose: Without Water Rich fruitcake notes with hints of stewed prunes. A hint of mixed spice emerges with a touch of milk chocolate sweetness.

Palate: Gentle and warming with a burst of menthol freshness. A sherried edge with a touch of chilli spices linger. Creamy with fruity influences.

Diluted Nose: Pronounced Sherry influences with fruitcake notes. Heavily fruity with a sherried edge.

Diluted Palate: Delicate with a defined freshness. Hints of rum and raisin and a subtle hint of Sherry. Some mixed spices and a marshmallow sweetness.

Body: Medium to full.

Finish: Long and warming.

- 1) A number of people claim that Strathisla is the oldest continuously operating distillery in Scotland. It was founded in 1786 by George Taylor and Alexander Milne under the name **Milltown distillery**.
- 2) Strathisla as a single malt is limited because most of the malt whisky that is produced at the distillery is used in the various Chivas Regal blends.

Colour: Dark Amber

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Tasting #3 – Strathisla – President's Choice 25 Year Old, Cask # 58.15 'Gravitas in a glass'

Colour: Golden Amber

Nose: Gravitas in a glass someone said – Aromas of marmalade, toffee, syrup, coconut and exotic fruits (melon, lychee Gewwurztraminer) with some gentle hints of wood sap shrubberies and rose gardens.

Palate: The palate had a surprisingly strong Armagnac (Cognac like) character. It is juicy mouth watering and mellow with sandalwood, tropical friuts and mixed spices (pepper, ginger, chili).

Diluted Nose: Water brought a beehive (beeswax, honey wood) in a garden.

Diluted Palate: The palate now suggested raisins soaked in brandy, dried flowers, sultanas, dates and warming spices.

Comments: To muse over after dinner.

Tasting #4 – Laphroaig 17 Year Old, Cask # 29.201 'Peat smoked candied Angelica'

Colour: Light copper

Nose: Like a walk in humidor with a chocolate fountain in the middle.

Palate: The taste came as a surprise, medicinal peat smoke, ash and tar.

Diluted Palate: Water turned it into a smoked chicken pot pie and sweet smoked candied angelicas.

Comments: When in need of a camp fire with your sea air.

Finish: Lemon peels and green apples. Oak-y vanilla sticks around for a good few

minutes afterwards.

Comments: From a closed Distillery.

Extremely Rare: 2 of 235 Released to the USA



Grain Whisky

- Grain Alcohol is mass produced.
- The base wash is Corn, Wheat, and Rye
- Most of the Alcohol is used in blended whiskies.
 (Most blends are 70% grain alcohol and 30% blend of single malts)
- It is very rare for a Scottish Grain Alcohol to be used as a single product.
- Aging: What it's aged in, where, and length of aging are very important to the end product.
- Our Grain Whiskies tonight are all extremely rare.
- Tonight's Grain Whiskies are all from closed distilleries.
